Class 6 Remote Learning plan

Week beginning 1.3.21

Welcome our last remote learning plan before all of the children return to school the following week on Monday 8th March. I have sent all of our remote learners a link to a Teams meeting on Thursday 4th March. The children will be split into two groups this time. The aim of this meeting is to talk to the children about the return to school and hopefully help with any questions or worries that they might have as they prepare to start a new chapter back in school. For those children who are in school, I will repeat the meeting for them as well in school on Thursday.

This week's plan has curriculum lesson from Monday to Thursday and on Friday is World Book Day.



This week in English Miss Mullins will take us through the preparation and planning stages to write a persuasive and this will conclude our Sherlock Holmes unit.

Monday To develop a rich understanding of words associated with sadness and anger In this lesson, we will introduce new vocabulary, identify word pairs and synonyms and apply the vocabulary in sentences. Once you've watched the video, complete Monday sadness and anger

Tuesday To write the opening of a persuasive letter In this lesson, we will use the vocabulary we have generated so far to write the opening paragraph of our letter. Once you've watched the video, complete Tuesday letter opening

Wednesday To practise and apply our understanding of suffixes In this lesson, we will recap the rules associated with adding the suffixes -er and -est for comparative and superlative adjectives, look at some exceptions of the rules and learn a spelling practice strategy. The 10 spelling words set in the previous lesson will be revisited and tested.

Thursday To plan the main body of the lesson To write the main body of a letter

In this lesson, we will read a model and plan the main body paragraph of our letter and then in the following video we will use our planning to write the main body of our letter. Children will also have the optional extra task of writing the closing paragraph

Friday is World Book Day activities linked to the text 'The Explorer' by Katherine Rundell Details of the activities are towards the bottom of the remote learning plan.



This week's statistics lesson teaches us about reading different kinds of tables including; tables, two way table and timetables.



Lesson 2 Re-watch the PowerPoint show and this time, think about which event you think would have been the 'turning point'. The 'turning point' is the main event that leads to a big change the direction of the war and ultimately to the allies defeating the axis powers. Complete the <u>Turning Point Analysis activity</u> to help you (you may need to Re-watch the video and pause it at the event that you choose as the main turning point)



Lesson 1: What are the different animal kingdoms? (thenational.academy) In this week's lesson we are going to learn how living organisms are classified. We will learn about the 5 kingdoms



This could include getting grandparents or other family members to read stories over video chat; setting aside a family reading time when everyone at home all read their own books or magazines; building a cosy reading den with cushions in a corner, or a sheet draped over chairs to make a tent; read a story or chapter and then act it out together. The book that I have chosen o share with you is 'The Explorer' by Katherine Rundell.



On Friday, I will upload extracts of the book for the children to listen to and so that they can choose which of the following tasks that they would like to complete: (Try to aim for 3!)



Task 1) Use a thesaurus to find feelings to describe how you would be feeling if you were one of the children and put these into Explorer Feelings display (See Purple Mash)

Task 2) Post card-writing as 'Fred', write a Postcard that you would send to your dad. Include; thoughts, feelings and key events, For a template see <u>Fred Postcard task</u> (<u>Purple Mash</u>)



Task 3) Write a <u>survival list (See Purple Mash)</u> what have the children got to find in order to survive? Include reasons for your choices e.g.

1) Water- without water we wouldn't survive therefore this would be the most essential item on the list. You could either do this on paper or using <u>2publish</u>

Task 4) Read extract 3 and answer the quiz questions Explorer quiz(See Purple Mash)

Task 5) Read extract 4 and become a vocabulary detective....... can you find......? See Explorer vocabulary detective(See Purple Mash)



Task 6) Create a picture of what you see in your mind's eye-you can either do this on paper using Explorer minds eye (See Purple Mash) or on Purple Mash 2 Publish (see 2do)

Task 7) There are a large number of dangers in the Amazon jungle. Your task is to find out about some of the most hazardous animals for the children to avoid.

You could create a leaflet (set as Purple Mash 2do), a poster, a piece of art work or a video recording to show what you find out. Remember to include:

- 1. The name of the animal
- 2. A description of them
- 3. Where they might be lurking
- 4. How they could hurt you
